Research Topics:

Humans are social creatures; spending the majority of our lives talking with, interacting with, and thinking about other people. How we interpret our social experiences, and express and act upon our emotions and the feelings of people around us can encourage, maintain, or disrupt social relationships. Social interactions are also critically guided by our knowledge of people's inner mental lives, their minds. We understand people as intentional beings, and thus, we interpret actions and emotions with respect to what a person, or what we think a person, wants, believes, or is thinking about. My empirical research integrates these foundations of cognitive and social knowledge by investigating children's and adults' understanding about connections between different kinds of mental states (e.g., how thoughts influence emotions; how emotions shape decisions) as well as their reasoning about how people's negative and positive life experiences bias how they later interpret and emotionally react to new situations, make decisions, and anticipate the future. Additional research investigates how children and adults attend to and process emotional stimuli, development and individual differences in cognitive processes, biases and heuristics in how children and adults perceive social groups, prosocial decision making and intergroup biases, reasoning about willpower and transgression, and recognition of diversity versus common ground in how different people interpret and emotionally respond to situations.
